B. CODE ENFORCEMENT: Graffiti has started to rise again after an approximately three month lull. The 7791 Mandrell property is in foreclosure. All things considered, Oak View area is in good shape

C. COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT:

D. CSP: CSP serviced 400 people from March through May. HBYS had five referrals. OVHS had a presentation covering red-flags for gang membership and drug use with 30 parents attending. The Leadership group participated in the Cinco de Mayo Festival and the Oak View Art Gallery. Job Career Readiness Class had 20 students from OVHS complete the course and given a tour of Angel Stadium and spoke to an Angel executive about jobs/careers. On June 5, there was a Town Hall Meeting with HBPD Chief Robert Handy. About 100 residents and collaborative members meet and voiced concerns about the community. Vandalism Prevention Workshops had 180, 4th and 5th graders participated. Summer programs targeting male middle school students focused on Job Career Readiness, Gang Awareness and Resistance, Drug Awareness, Vandalism Prevention, and Back to School Workshops hoping to get 50 students in total to participate.

E. Office of Business Development: CPAB's recommendation to continue funding for Code Enforcement in the Oak View neighborhood (\$225,787), the Boys and Girls Club (\$47,500) and the Oak View Library Literacy Program (\$10,000).

H. OAK VIEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL:

I. OAK VIEW FAMILY AND COMMUNITY CENTER: FRC was awarded a grant through the NCL for the Oak View Library Homework Club. The Student to Business Program hosted 15, 5th grade girls on 5 field trips to area businesses, organizations, and universities to provide them with opportunity to meet professional women in a variety of careers. In April FRC hosted the "Rose & Thorn" Art Event. Over 100 youths in k-12th grade submitted art, writing and photography and over 50 people attended the event. In June there was a Father's Day Family Event with 5 fathers from the community attending this special event. This summer Youth Action Council will be facilitating a Girls Empowerment Group for 10-12 girls who will be entering 6th grade in the fall. Oak View elementary will be selecting the girls they would like to attend. FRC, along with the Boys & Girls Club

once again received a CDBG Grant to continue funding the After School Recreation Program for the 2014-15 contract year. FRC is in the process of writing a 5-year grant to request renewed funding from the County of Orange. We are seeking letters of support from professionals and community residents to submit with our application. Letters are needed as soon as possible.
