**OCTOBER DONATION UPDATE**

The Huntington Beach Neighborhood Watch Program (HBNW) **fiscal year** is from July 1 to June 30 each year. We have estimated we will need approximately \$24,300 this year to cover the various HBNW program expenses which include, but are not limited to, newsletter assembly, distribution costs, returned postage, mailing labels, etc. From the start of our fiscal year to now, we have received **\$4,388.24 in donations and newsletter advertisements— we have \$19,911.76 to go by June 30, 2013.** The HBNW Board thanks you and our advertisers for your support and generous donations. A \$6 donation pays for each subscriber's distribution costs; a \$10 donation helps with these costs and other needed expenses and puts your name in the Newsletter as a contributor; and a \$25 or more donation accomplishes the above, plus you will receive a HBNW sticker and a token of appreciation. **HOLIDAY CHEER  
IS HERE**



Thanksgiving is just around the corner... then comes Hanukkah, Christmas, and all the other holidays.

Are you prepared to take a pro-active stand against crime and help the police protect you? Although nothing can guarantee you will not be the victim of a crime, it is your responsibility to take steps to help harden the target and minimize your chances of becoming a victim. Criminals usually look for an easy target; open/unlocked doors and windows, items that are visible, (either by a front window, or in a vehicle) that might entice them to burglarize your home or vehicle. They also look for areas that will help them stay hidden, such as tall bushes and back yard gates that allow them easy access and keep them out of sight. Criminals will usually avoid well lit areas or places where there are a lot of people, barking dogs, or good neighbors that know one another. Neighborhoods with an **active** Neighborhood Watch Program are good deterrents. Here are a few things you can do to prevent crime in your neighborhood that are of little or no cost to you:

- Use motion sensors or dusk to dawn lighting.
- Use timers in your home on a regular basis, not just when you go on vacation or are away.
- Use thorny bushes around windows and wherever they might be useful.

## Wildlife and Coyote Information



Many residents in Orange County experience occasional visits from local wildlife such as coyotes. If you have small pets, they can easily become coyote prey. Cats and small dogs should not be allowed outside alone, even in a fenced yard. It is highly recommended that you always accompany small pets. Though coyotes generally hunt between sunset and sunrise, they can be observed at all hours of the day and will not pass up the opportunity for an easy meal. A dog or cat left in a backyard can be taken in a matter of moments. Eradication and/or relocation of the urban coyote is not effective. Experts say these programs actually provide a vacuum in nature, causing these animals to have even larger litters, ultimately increasing the coyote population. You can help discourage wildlife activity in your neighborhood by following the hints listed below:

- Keep pet food indoors and do not leave food of any kind outside at night. Food left out at night will attract rodents and be taken as a welcome invitation by wildlife. This may prompt a future visit.
- Keep cats and small dogs indoors or in the close presence of an adult.
- Remove any fruit which has fallen to the ground.
- Store trash in covered, heavy-duty containers.
- Keep yards free from potential shelter such as thick brush and weeds and enclose the bottoms of porches and decks.
- Eliminate garbage, debris, lumber piles, etc...
- Check fencing and try to eliminate access points to roof tops.
- Change automatic sprinkler settings regularly.

Taking these preventive measures will help to deter wildlife from visiting your property. OC Animal Care will respond to situations regarding any wildlife that is sick, injured, dead, or has had physical contact with a human or domestic animal. - Lock your gates to limit access to your back yard. If you are concerned about utility companies, call and make arrangements to schedule an appointment for them to check your meters.
- Limit the information you or your family put on the internet. Never announce if you will be away.
- Use the free Vacation House Check service provided by the HBPD's RSVP Program.
- Call to arrange a Neighborhood Watch Block meeting on your street and for your surrounding neighborhood. It is very important that neighbors get to know one another.
- Always be aware of your surroundings. When shopping and carrying packages don't carry so many that it will obstruct your view. You can always ask a sales clerk to assist you.
- Keep all doors and windows locked when you are away and keep doors locked even when you're home. Keep your garage door locked and closed too.
- Lock and secure your vehicle and do not leave items (backpacks, etc.) in plain view. Either leave them home or lock them in your trunk.

Applications **will be accepted for the next RSVP academy through November 28<sup>th</sup>, 2012.**


