City Hires New Fire Chief—David A. Segura

City Manager Fred Wilson announced the appointment of David Segura as Huntington Beach's new Fire Chief. He will assume his duties on Monday, April 4, leading a department that supports eight fire stations, 198 positions and an annual operating budget of \$45.6 million.

"I firmly believe David is well qualified for this position and the men and women of the fire department will be well-served with him as the new Chief," said Wilson. "David brings with him a good mix of strategic planning, community engagement and organizational development."

A 32-year veteran within the fire service and a Huntington Beach resident, Segura brings a wealth of experience having served the past 29 years in the City of Long Beach as a Fire-fighter, Paramedic, Captain, Battalion Chief, Assistant Chief and Deputy Chief.

"I am excited and honored to be joining the Huntington Beach Fire Department as its Chief," said Segura. "I am looking forward to meeting the men and women of the Department, getting to know the community and improving upon what is already an established Department," he said.

Contributing to Segura's strong leadership and organizational management style is a broad educational background. Segura holds an Associate's Degree from Long Beach City College, a Bachelors Degree from California State University Long Beach and is working to complete his Masters Degree in Public Administration from CSULB.

He has resided in the City for the past 16 years with his wife, Cathy. He is the proud father of four sons - Justin, Christopher, Michael and Stephen, and one grandson - Aiden. When not working, he enjoys spending time with his family, as well as travelling and wakeboarding on Lake Havasu. Recently, he and his wife have successfully embraced the arena of competitive dog competitions, particularly dock jumping and flyball racing with their two dogs, Ivy and Ollie.

Segura's selection comes after a national search to replace Chief Patrick McIntosh who retired in fall 2015.

New Building Permits

Building permits were issued last Friday, March 4, for construction of a new Medical Office Building at 17762 Beach Boulevard (southeast corner of Beach Blvd. and Newman Ave.). The 44,500 square foot, two story medical office building site includes a public open space plaza along the Beach Blvd. frontage with seating, landscaping, and a public art element. Additionally, the project includes a complete overhaul of the existing parking structure, surface parking lot and pedestrian connections to the new facility. Completion of the facility is anticipated by Fall 2016.

Construction Permit Valuation Activity Continues to be Robust


Fiscal year 15/16 construction activity continues on a strong pace at \$87,272,225 to date. In the month of February, the Hilton Hotel Expansion construction permit was issued for a new 213,080 square foot, 10-story, 152 room hotel at 21100 Pacific Coast Highway. The expansion includes pool, restaurant, ballroom and 10 meeting rooms.

Activity at the planning and building counters remains steady over the winter months. Permit activity has increased 11% for the same time period last year. The number of inspections done YTD is 15% higher than last year. While building plan check submittals and planning entitlements processed are up 19% and 25% respectively for the same time period last year. Overall development activity continues to be strong.



BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

APPLICATION PERIOD OPEN THROUGH MARCH 28 FOR CALIFORNIA COMPETES TAX CREDIT —TAKE ADVANTAGE OF FREE ASSISTANCE WEBINARS—

The California Competes Tax Credit is an income tax credit available to businesses that want to come to California or stay and grow in California. The application period for the current cycle opened on March 7 and closes March 28 for the estimated \$50.9 million in available credits. Hundreds of businesses of all sizes have benefitted from this program, which is operated by the Governor's Office of Business Development. Two Huntington Beach businesses – Electronic Waveform Lab, Inc. and Alpha & Omega Computer Network Services - have already benefitted from this program with as little as zero investment and cumulatively generated 22 jobs in our community as a result.

Career Online High School Program Available for Free to Huntington Beach Residents

Huntington Beach Public Library is offering qualified community members the opportunity to earn an accredited high school diploma and credentialed career certificate through *Career Online High School*, a program brought to public libraries by Gale, a part of Cengage Learning.

HBPL will award scholarships for *Career Online High School* to qualified learners looking to earn a high school diploma and advance their careers. Classes are supported by board-certified instructors, and students have 24/7 access to the online learning platform, along with an academic coach. Coursework begins in one of eight high-growth, high-demand career fields before progressing to the core academic subjects. Many students are able to graduate in as few as 4 to 6 months by transferring in previously earned high school credits, with a maximum completion of 18 months.





POLICE DEPARTMENT



The 2016 Huntington Beach Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) registration is open. CERT classes train and prepare Huntington Beach residents to be self-sufficient in a disaster. Huntington Beach has highly trained and well-equipped public safety personnel, but if a major disaster occurs there could be a shortage of fire and police personnel available to respond to all calls for help. It could take more than 72-hours before the Fire Department can respond to your home or business during a major disaster. CERT volunteers are trained to prepare for and respond to a disaster until first responders arrive. You will learn to manage a disaster in your home, work, neighborhood or school. After taking care of yourself and your family, you

can report to the city and perform duties such as providing damage assessment information about your neighborhood, sandbagging, sheltering, checking on the frail and elderly, working in the Emergency Operation Center (EOC), and providing support to the Fire and Police Departments.

The series consists of several classes that build on each other and ends with a disaster drill where you will practice what you have learned. In the Save-A-Life Saturday series of classes you will learn how to:

- ◆ Prepare your home and family for a disaster
- ◆ Perform basic first aid and CPR
- ◆ Safely search a building and rescue trapped victims
- ◆ Put out small fires using a fire extinguisher
- ◆ Survive outdoors if you cannot return to your home because it is unsafe
- ◆ Use all these skills together and create a Neighborhood CERT Disaster Team

2/26/16 Report

Fire Department Units responded for a reported car into a house. Firefighters placed shoring under the garage header which allowed the car to be relocated, and the garage door to be removed which allowed the homeowner to remove their own car. Fire Department Units responded for a reported traffic collision with an overturned car. On arrival, firefighters found a two vehicle accident with one car overturned and the driver still inside. The car had broken the guy wires for an Edison electrical pole, and the pole was leaning slightly. The patient was extricated from the car. Fire and police units isolated the area around the pole and waited for Edison to arrive.

Heil Fire Station Remodel Begins

On Monday, February 22, Fire Station 8 (Heil Station) began a long overdue remodel. The Station was originally built in 1963 and has never undergone a major renovation. The Station will remain open for Fire, Rescue and Emergency Medical coverage with personnel temporarily moving into an onsite trailer. The remodel will consist of a new kitchen and bathroom with a focus on gender privacy accommodations and ADA compliancy. The construction is expected to last four to six months.

The State Department asks: "Passport Expiring Soon? Renew It Now!"

If you have a United States passport expiring any time in 2016, the State Department has a message for you: **Renew it now**. If you will be applying for a first-time passport: **Apply now!**

Ten years ago the State Department and the public were gearing up for the 2007 effective date of the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative. This new regulation required passports for Americans traveling by air to and from Mexico, Canada, the Caribbean and Bermuda. Now that those 10-year passports are approaching their expiration date, it is possible to experience the same crush of application renewals that happened in 2006 and 2007. At that time the lines were very long and processing time almost doubled. Some travelers were not getting their passports in time to make their much anticipated trips. We are hoping to avoid the rush of applicants, and therefore the same congestion in the processing flow. We are already seeing an uptick in applications and the surge is expected to continue throughout this year.

"We were overwhelmed then, and we are not going to be overwhelmed again," said Michele Bond, the assistant secretary of state for consular affairs, who oversees passports. She has been on a campaign to cajole Americans into renewing early.

Why Use the Huntington Beach City Hall Passport Application Acceptance Facility in the Office of the City Clerk? Here is an unsolicited and unedited email received this week from a happy customer.

Dear Ms. Flynn,

I had the pleasure of visiting your office this afternoon on personal business to obtain a passport. I had visited the U.S. Post Office in Huntington Beach at 3:30 pm and found that it was closed for passport issuance. They referred me to your office. I do not live in your city and am visiting here for a business conference. I drove to City Hall, hoping that I would be able to get in line and file my passport paperwork before you closed. I arrived at approximately 3:50 pm and was amazed at how quickly I was greeted and served. Within just a few minutes, I was finished and on my way.

All of the staff at your passport windows were professional and courteous. I do not have the name of the person who waited on me, but she was at the last window on the left (on your side of the office.) She was patient, cheerful and upbeat and I know that is not always easy at the end of the long workweek. Please extend my thanks to her for her courtesy.

I value outstanding customer service and wanted you to know that your office did a great job today. In the Federal Court in which I work, I strive to instill these same values in our staff and I would be proud to have your staff work in our Court. The person who waited on me is a great example of the best in government.


